Opportunities on Heard Island 1999-2000

Plans are being developed for an ANARE multi-disciplinary scientific program on Heard Island during summer 1999—2000. Logistic support is as yet uncertain but it is hoped that shipping schedules will allow early September and mid December 1999 arrivals at Heard Island, with a departure in February or March 2000. A 3 day informal workshop about Heard Island is planned for Hobart in early July 1998.

Deaths

Peter Prince, an outstanding Antarctic ornithologist, died suddenly at home in England on 25 February. He was 48 years old. His broad interests in many areas of natural history and conservation, as well as his studies on birds in many countries, mean he will be sorely missed.

Mike Prebble, closely associated with New Zealand's Antarctic activities through his work for the Marsden Fund and as a member of the NZ Antarctic Treaty delegation, died suddenly in April whilst on holiday near Auckland. He was 58 years old.

Tony Edwards, who began as a surveyor for British Antarctic Survey in 1960 and moved to United Nations Environment Program in Nairobi, died on 23 April in Geneva. He was the UNEP representative at the ATCMs.
