## CONTRIBUTORS

**Yael Mabat** is a research fellow at the Sverdlin Institute for Latin American Studies at Tel Aviv University and a lecturer in the university's History department. Her academic interests focus on modern Christianity in the Americas, in particular, the role of Christianity as a catalyst of social change. She is working on a book manuscript titled "Christian Renewal on the Top of the Andes: The Early Dynamics of Latin America's Religious Transformation" (under contract with the University of Nebraska Press).

**Pedro M. Cameselle-Pesce** is an Assistant Professor of History at Western Washington University. He is writing a book tentatively titled "Forgotten Neighbors: The Challenge of Uruguay-United States Relations During the FDR Era, 1929–1945," which explores the political and cultural influence of Roosevelt's image in Uruguay and examines the impact of transnational non-state actors in international relations. He was a Fulbright scholar in Uruguay in 2015.

**Andrew B. Ehrinpreis** is a lecturer at Queens College in New York and an attorney. He completed his PhD at Stony Brook University (SUNY) in August 2018. He is working on a book, tentatively titled "Coca Nation: Labor, Indigeneity, and the Politics of the Coca Leaf in Bolivia, 1900–1962," that identifies and explores profound changes in the political economy and cultures of coca in Bolivia in the middle decades of the twentieth century. His research, which has been funded by the Social Science Research Council (SSRC), Open Society Foundations (OSF), and Stony Brook University, focuses on dynamic historical relationships between drugs, race, labor, and power.

**Marilia Corrêa** is a Postdoctoral Fellow at the Weiser Center for Emerging Democracies (at University of Michigan) for 2019–21. She completed her PhD in History at the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign in 2019. Her current research examines the experiences of officers and soldiers who were expelled from the armed forces and persecuted during Brazil's military dictatorship (1964–1985). Focusing on the life trajectories of these men during military rule and after re-democratization, she examines how their cases can expand our understanding of the social and cultural reach of the dictatorship. Her doctoral research has been funded by different organizations, including the Lemann Institute for Brazilian Studies, the Tinker Foundation, and the Illinois

Program for Research in the Humanities (IPRH) at the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign.

**Francisco Morales, OFM** (Universidad de las Américas, Puebla) is director of the Biblioteca Franciscana. He obtained a doctoral degree at The Catholic University of America and was a resident member of the Academy of American Franciscan History from 1974 to 1986. He specializes in the history of the Franciscans in Mexico during the colonial times, with special focus on the difficult encounter between the Spanish Catholicism and the Mesoamerican religion. He is author of several books and articles published in Mexico, the United States, and Spain. He is an Associated Member of the Academia Mexicana de la Historia. In 2017 he received the Distinguished Alumnus Award from The Catholic University of America.
