Nigel Bonner

Nigel Bonner died suddenly at home on 27 August 1994. He was well known for his SCAR activities in support of Antarctic conservation, and his contributions over many years to the ecology of marine mammals.

SCAR XXIII

Most of the Working Groups met during the first week of SCAR XXIII in Rome (29 August–9 September). During the same period there were parallel meetings of COMNAP and SCALOP, giving excellent opportunities for interactions between the scientists and the managers. An especially productive element was the workshop on Antarctic astronomy, arranged by STAR Working Group, which attracted over 60 participants from many countries. During the second week the meeting of delegates elected a new president (Professor A C Rocha-Campos, Brazil) and two new vice-presidents (Prof P G Quilty, Australia & Prof O Orheim, Norway). The meeting agreed to a major change in the format of the tasks for the global change group of specialists (GLOCHANT). This has prioritised the science initiatives, thus reducing their major tasks for the immediate future. In addition the meeting deciding not to proceed at present with the establishment of a special fund for these activities. SCAR XXIV will take place in Cambridge, UK during August 1996.

International database on Antarctic tourism

The International Centre for Antarctic Information and Research (ICAIR) has been working with COMNAP and IAATO for some time to attain international agreement on a standard form for reporting of Antarctic tourism data. It has now been agreed that an international database on Antarctic tourism will be developed and maintained by ICAIR in collaboration with IAATO, with material support being provided by the governments of the United States of America, United Kingdom and New Zealand. Germany, Argentina and The Netherlands are also enthusiastic to support this development.

Science at the Poles Exhibition

A new permanent exhibition, highlighting the similarities and differences in the environment and history of the Arctic and Antarctic, has opened at the Scott Polar Research Institute in Cambridge UK. The exhibition, mounted jointly by British Antarctic Survey and the SPRI is designed to increase public awareness of the scientific importance of the polar regions.
