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This issue contains five articles that deal with international security. This is rather a lot for a journal known for its emphasis on international political economy, and a sharp contrast to the previous issue, which dealt entirely with “IPE.” This was not planned. As editors, we have sought to encourage more submissions on security topics, as we do not believe the distinction historically made in our field between security and economic policy is a useful one. Thus we are pleased to publish these five pieces on security. Their appearance all at once, however, is an accident of the ebb and flow of the publication process, not a consequence of a deliberate effort to concentrate them in a single issue. The articles also demonstrate the range of approaches in our field: constructivism and the role of norms and ideas, domestic institutions and foreign policy choices, and formal models of strategic interaction. As always, and as affirmed by this issue, we welcome submissions from all branches of our discipline.
