Members of the African Studies Association will be allowed a fifty per cent discount on the regular price of \$5.00 for Joseph Greenberg's revised and enlarged Studies in African Linguistics, which is being published by the Indiana University Research Center in Anthropology, Folklore and Linguistics. The reduction in price is provided because the publication was subsidized by the Languages and Linguistics Committee of the Association.

Carnegie Corporation has granted \$43,000 to the College of Social Studies, Kenya, for short courses for adult students, and \$70,000 to the University College, Tanganyika, for support of its extra-mural program.

Recent African grants by the Ford Foundation have included: \$20,000 to the Catholic Near East Welfare Association, for a conference on the place

of Islam and African religions in African development, and on Christianity and religious syncretism in Africa; \$100,000 to the Congo National School of Law and Administration for the construction of student housing; \$110,000 to the University of Dakar, for faculty exchange with American law schools and research on African law; \$23,500 to the Museum Trustees of Kenya, for development of the Coryndon Memorial Museum as a scientific educational resource; \$118,000 to Massachusetts Institute of Technology, for research on employment of school leavers in Nigeria, and on planning problems of the Niger River; \$150,000 to the government of Eastern Nigeria for construction of a civil service training center; \$11,000 to Tanganyika National Parks for an educational program on wildlife conservation as an economic resource; and \$22,000 to the University of Ghana for the establishment of a test development unit at the Institute of Education.

A three-year research project on Southern Africa has been undertaken by the California Institute of Technology, with an emphasis on economic development. Six members of the Institute staff began preliminary field surveys in summer 1962; after the first year this team, which is primarily made up of social scientists, will be joined by scientists in such fields as nutrition, water, production methods and the composition and use of building materials.

Recent Publications

The Hoover Institution, Stanford University, is now publishing a quarterly Africana Newsletter, the first issue of which appeared in October. The newsletter, which was undertaken as a result of recommendations from the ASA Libraries Committee, is designed to provide practical information on such matters as reference works being published in Africa south of the Sahara, listings of acquisitions of Africa-related documents, bibliographic studies, and research projects. Addresses of government printers, book dealers, archives, periodicals and newspapers will occasionally be included. Sections on archival and manuscript collections and on news and queries will be regular features.

The newsletter, which is published in English and French, is edited by Peter Duignan. Subscriptions are \$3.50 a year.

The Nigerian Journal of Economic and Social Studies is now published regularly three times a year. This is the journal of the Nigerian Economic Society, with a central interest in Africa and other economically underdeveloped areas, but it publishes material on other topics as well.
