On the cover: *Bolshevism on Trial*, released in April 1919 as the Red Scare escalated, was one of the first and more prominent of a number of anti-communist films released during the era. It had been adapted from a 1909 anti-socialist novel by Thomas Dixon, who had also written *The Clansman*, which influenced the D. W. Griffith film *Birth of a Nation*. Governor Calvin Coolidge of Massachusetts, soon to become an anti-communist hero, wrote to the New England distribution manager: "I think the idea of the film, *Bolshevism on Trial*, is very timely. We surely need to educate our people along the lines your picture depicts. I hope it will be very successful."
