**A Report on the Congressional Fellowship Program, 1994–95 and 1995–96**

The Congressional Fellowship Program is a professional-level internship that gives academics, journalists, federal executives, and other professionals an opportunity to work on the staffs of senators, representatives, and congressional committees. Its goals are:

- to improve the quality of scholarship and teaching on Congress and American national politics
- to enhance public understanding of Congress and policy making, and
- to provide professionals from several fields with practical experience in Congress and insight into the legislative process

Since 1953, the first year of the Program, there has been a total of 1,613 Fellows, including 248 political scientists, 204 journalists, 791 federal executives, 314 medical faculty, and others.

Although the first class of Fellows had only six members, in recent years the Program has grown to include up to 50 Fellows each year. The political science and journalism Fellows are selected in nationwide competitions. Political science applicants must have completed their doctorates within the last fifteen years or be near completion, and reporters must have a bachelor's degree and between two and ten years of professional experience in newspaper, magazine, television, or radio reporting. Criteria for selection are quality training, demonstrated competence, maturity and responsibility, relevance of fellowship experience to career goals, and potential for professional advancement.

While the political scientists and journalists remain the core of the program and are supported by the APSA through contributions from corporations and foundations, the majority of each year's class of Fellows participates in the program through affiliate arrangements, including:

- federal executives (Grades 13–16) supported by agency training funds
