## THE CONTRIBUTORS

EDWARD SHILS is Professor in the Committee on Social Thought and the Department of Sociology at the University of Chicago.

MORTON A. KAPLAN, Assistant Professor of Political Science at the University of Chicago, is Visiting Research Associate at the Center of International Studies, Princeton University, during the current academic year. The author of *System and Process in International Politics* (1957), he is engaged in writing, with Nicholas Katzenbach, *The Political Foundations of International Law*.

CHARLES R. NIXON, Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of California (Los Angeles), helped to organize the Institute for Social Research at the University of Natal, Durban, in 1954. He has recently prepared a short study of the non-European franchise in South Africa.

WILLIAM N. LOUCKS is Professor of Economics at the Wharton School of Finance and Commerce, University of Pennsylvania. On leave during the past year, he visited Yugoslavia where he studied the workers' councils and co-operative movement. The fifth edition of his textbook, *Comparative Economic Systems*, appeared in 1957.

CHARLES P. KINDLEBERGER is Professor of Economics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. His most recent publication is *Economic Development* (1958).

ROBERT A. DAHL is Eugene Meyer Professor of Political Science at Yale. He is the author of *A Preface to Democratic Theory* (1955) and is currently engaged in a study of leadership and influence in the city of New Haven, Conn.

WALTER R. SHARP, Professor of Political Science and Director of Graduate Studies in International Relations at Yale University, is the author of *International Technical Assistance: Programs and Organization* (1952). He is making an extensive study of field administration in the United Nations system.

LUCIAN W. PYE is Associate Professor of Political Science and a senior staff member of the Center for International Studies, M.I.T. The author of *Guerrilla Communism in Malaya* (1956), he is now engaged in field work in Burma for a forthcoming book on political behavior in transitional societies.

ALEXANDER ECKSTEIN, Lecturer in Economics and Research Associate in the Center for Asian Studies at Harvard, is author of *National Income and Capital Formation in Hungary, 1900-1950*, co-author of *Prospects for Communist China* (1954) and *Moscow-Peking Axis* (1957), and is completing a monograph on National Product in Communist China.

JEROME BLUM is Associate Professor of History at Princeton University, where he teaches courses in European economic history.

HENRY W. EHRMANN, Professor of Political Science at the University of Colorado, is spending 1958-1959 in France under the SSRC program of field research, preparing a volume on "Interest Groups in the Governmental Process in Western Europe." He is author of *Organized Business in France* (1957) and editor and co-author of *Interest Groups on Four Continents* (1958).
