## THE CONTRIBUTORS

THOMAS PERRY THORNTON is on the staff of the Chief of Naval Operations in the Navy Department. During 1961-1962, on leave from the government, he will come to the Center of International Studies at Princeton University as Visiting Research Associate.

MALCOLM W. HOAG, a research economist in Santa Monica, Calif., was Professor of Foreign Affairs at the National War College in 1959-1960.

SEYOM BROWN, Instructor in the Government Programs in Administration and Harper Fellow in Political Science at the University of Chicago during the past year, has been awarded a grant for 1961-1962 from the Social Science Research Council to study the feasibility of a supranational nuclear deterrent force.

JOHN D. MONTGOMERY is Director of the Center for Development Research and Training, African Studies Program, at Boston University. His publications include *Forced to Be Free* (1957), *Cases in Vietnamese Administration* (1959), and a forthcoming study, *The Politics of Foreign Aid*.

YUSIF A. SAYIGH, Associate Professor of Economics at the American University in Beirut, has just completed a year as Visiting Associate Professor at Princeton University. He is the author of *The Economic Impact of the Arab Refugee Problem on Lebanon, Syria, and Jordan* (1954) and *Entrepreneurs of Lebanon: The Business Leader in a Developing Economy*, now in press.

KARL VON VORYS, Assistant Professor of Political Science at San Fernando Valley State College, Northridge, Calif., will be a Fulbright Lecturer at the University of Dacca in Pakistan in 1961-1962. He is preparing a book entitled *The Political Framework of Economic Development*.

EDWARD SHILS is Professor of Sociology and Social Thought in the Committee on Social Thought at the University of Chicago and Fellow of King's College, Cambridge.

C. E. BLACK, Professor of History and Faculty Associate of the Center of International Studies at Princeton University, has been on leave this year as a Fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences. He is the editor and co-author of *The Transformation of Russian Society: Aspects of Social Change Since 1861* (1960) and of other books and articles on Russia and Eastern Europe.

HENRY PACTER teaches history at the New School for Social Research in New York City and is Acting Dean of its School of Politics. He is working on a study of East-West relations with the tentative title, *Terms of Co-existence*.

MORTON A. KAPLAN is Assistant Professor of Political Science and Chairman of the Committee on International Relations at the University of Chicago, as well as Research Associate of the Center of International Studies at Princeton. His most recent book, *The Political Foundations of International Law*, of which he and Nicholas deB. Katzenbach are co-authors, was published in June 1961.
