Horses played a vital role in medieval life, whether as richly caparisoned knights' chargers or humble beasts of burden. Archaeological sites in the City of London have uncovered an astonishing and valuable array of equestrian equipment, from bridle buckles, harness pendants, stirrups and spurs to horseshoes, grooming accessories and skeletal remains, providing a fascinating picture of life in the Middle Ages.

The book presents over 400 items in the form of text, engravings, illustrations, photographs, diagrams, maps, paintings and tables in a clear and informative manner and is essential reading for scholars of medieval and equestrian history, those investigating London and its medieval infrastructure, and horse enthusiasts everywhere.

- 1 All contributions, correspondence, and books for review should be sent to: The Editors, *The Historical Journal*, Faculty of History, West Road, Cambridge CB3 9EF.
- 2 *The Historical Journal* publishes articles on all aspects of history since the fifteenth century.
- 3 Articles must not exceed 10,000 words and communications 5,000 words in length.
- 4 Contributions should be typed double-spaced on A4 paper, with footnotes typed separately at the end of the contribution, and must observe the typographical and stylistic conventions of the *Journal*. A style-sheet is available from the Editors on request.
- 5 Authors should submit the top copy of their typescript and keep another copy to assist in their correction of proofs. When an article has been accepted for publication, the author is strongly encouraged to send a copy of the final version on computer disk (Apple Macintosh or IBM compatible PC) *together with* the hard copy typescript, giving details of the wordprocessing software used (Microsoft Word, Word or Word Perfect). However, the publisher reserves the right to typeset material by conventional means if an author's disk proves unsatisfactory.
- 6 Submission of an article is taken to imply that it has not previously been published, and is not being considered for publication elsewhere. Authors are also asked to provide brief details of any related article or book they are publishing elsewhere.
- 7 Authors who wish their contributions to be returned if not accepted for publication are asked to enclose return postage or international postage coupons.
