Her 1992 book, *Protecting Soldiers and Mothers: The Political Origins of Social Policy in the United States* won five scholarly awards in several disciplines, including APSA's 1993 Woodrow Wilson Foundation Award. Skocpol's newest book is *Diminished Democracy: From Membership to Management in American Civic Life*, forthcoming in January 2003.

Assuming the position of President-Elect is Susanne Hoeber Rudolph of the University of Chicago. As William Benton Distinguished Service Professor of Political Science her leading intellectual interests are in political economy and political sociology understood as macrohistorical enterprises; state formation in Europe and Asia; the politics of identity and difference; and religious movements in transnational space.

Rudolph has served the American Political Science Association in several roles: vice president in 1973-74; charter member of the Committee on the Status of Women in the Profession; the Committee on the Future of the Profession; numerous award committees, and the recent Public Presence Advisory Group.

Rudolph earned her B.A. at Sarah Lawrence College and her Ph.D. from Harvard University, with a dissertation on party in the context of Asian democracy in 1975.
