Agent-Based Modeling for Political Scientists: Hands-On Training for Non-Programmers

Sponsored by the Comparative Politics Organized section, this course will serve as a training session in the use of the PS-1 agent-based modeling tool kit to produce agent-based or computational models suitable for simulating theoretical problems and key relationships between variables of interest to the participants. Teaching British Politics: Substantive Issues

This course, sponsored by the British Politics Group, will present the most current substantive information on important subjects in British politics for instructors that teach courses on the subject as well as those that teach broader courses on comparative European politics. Preparing Junior Faculty of Color: The Tenure Process and Professional Development

Strategies for Field Research in Comparative and International Politics

Tools for Comparative Research on Parties—The Study of Political Parties in Western Europe

This course will address practical problems related to research on political parties in Western Europe and will include presentations from each participant followed by time for questions and answers. [1:00–5:00, no fee]

Sponsored by the Foundations of Political Theory Organized Section, this workshop features works in progress. Participants read papers in advance, then meet to talk in detail about how to make improvements. [1:00 – 7:00pm, no fee]
