Oil spills in Antarctic waters

The spill caused earlier this year by the sinking of the *Bahia Paraiso* has now been subjected to detailed assessments by US and Argentine scientists. Permanent subtidal and intertidal sampling sites have been established to compare oil-affected sites with control areas away from Palmer. Microbial degradation rates for oil incorporated into the sediments appear to be very low. The long-term effects of this for the benthic plants and invertebrates is unclear. In response to contact with oil, seabirds can often develop severe physiological disorders. Blood samples have been taken from seabirds in affected and control areas to monitor this.

International collaboration in assessing damage focussed on hydrocarbon analysis of the water column by University of Magellanes, Chile, and studies on benthic diatoms and microzooplankton by Instituto Antartico Argentino.

The Royal Navy ship HMS *Endurance* was also holed this last season. After hitting an iceberg on her way to provide support to an international geological party on James Ross Island she put in for repairs to Deception Island. Although no fuel tanks were damaged, pumping of oil-contaminated bilge water to keep the ship operating safely later left hydrocarbon traces in Hope Bay. Although minor, this incident raises the question of how much oil is entering the Southern Ocean through ship activities (both by scientific vessels and fishery vessels) and minor spills associated with station refuelling.

Antarctic Minerals Convention

For the Minerals Convention to come into force it is necessary for 16 Antarctic Treaty Consultative Parties to accede to it by 25 November 1989. These 16 must include at least five of the developing countries, as well as all of the claimant nations. At present it appears that Australia and possibly France (both claimant nations) will refuse to sign, despite their active participation in drafting the Convention. For scientific comment on the importance of the Convention see *Editorial* in this issue.

Council of Managers of National Antarctic Programmes (MNAP)

In October 1989 the first meeting of the newly constituted MNAP Council will take place at British Antarctic Survey, Cambridge under the chairmanship of Dr David Drewry. Issues to be considered include air operations, tourism, major collaborative science programmes and environmental protection.

New ship for polar research

British Antarctic Survey has placed a contract with Swan Hunter Shipbuilders Ltd for an ice-strengthened research and logistics vessel to be delivered in May 1991. The vessel, to be known as the *James Clark Ross*, will replace the RRS *John Biscoe*. Displacement will be about 7400 tonnes with 8500 shaft horsepower to propel the vessel which will be 97 m long with an 18.85 m beam and 6.3 m draught. It will provide a platform for biological oceanography and marine geoscience together with the capability of a logistics role in support of the British Antarctic stations.

BIOMASS publications

Covering krill, penguins, fish, oceanography and primary production, the volumes are a primary resource for Southern Ocean marine biologists.
