## News from Legal Systems and Software Suppliers

**WinScribe Europe** has recently launched version 3.3 of its Digital Dictation System (DDS). The major enhancements are the ability to import and read voice files from third-party dictation systems into WinScribe for translation and the introduction of a browser based systems manager. **MSS** have developed a new wireless laptop and PDA interface application for their *AlphaLAW-Vantage* practice management and case management modules. The increased technology now allows users to access and update

**Context** has claimed exclusivity for the complete archive of *Weekly Law Reports*. The WLR are available in either cd-rom or online format. For subscribers to Justis Daily Cases, summaries of reportable cases from the Incorporated Council of Law Reporting (ICLR) are available online within 24 hours of judgement. The WLR tables of contents are normally available before the printed version from the Context website. Context has also teamed up with The Scottish Council of Law Reporting to produce the *Session Cases* for the first time in an online format. The series contains all the key appellate decisions, civil and criminal, from the Court of Session and the High Court of Justiciary since coverage started in 1930. ## Government and Quasi-Legal news

### Copyright Changes

On 31st October the law on copyright changed, when the UK implemented the European Copyright Directive. The major change concerns the issue of "fair dealing", where previously the copying of material for research or private study was excepted from the copyright restrictions. Under the new law, copying made as part of research or for private study, but which is carried out for a commercial purpose, now requires permission from the copyright owner or a CLA licence, which permits certain copying. The CLA have made available Business Licences, which allow, for a fee, companies to copy from over three million UK titles and 16 million non-UK titles. ### Legal Deposit Libraries Act

On October 30 the Legal Deposit Libraries Act 2003 received Royal Assent. Since the Copyright Act 1911, UK law has stipulated that one copy of all publications printed in the UK must be sent to one of the legal deposit libraries for archiving. This Act extends the law so that non-print materials are also archived to preserve a lot of information which will otherwise be lost to future generations. Other countries, such as New Zealand and France, have already implemented legislation to cover this data preservation issue, and many other countries are currently drafting proposals.

### UK Central Government Web Archive

The UK Central Government Web Archive is a selective collection of 50 UK Government websites, which are being archived as part of the *Modernising Government White Paper* proposals. The web is becoming the principal means of interaction between the government, citizens and business, and the National Archives have a responsibility to collect and preserve websites as evidence of the changing face of this interaction. The Internet Archive is a service which has been contracted for one year to set up this Web Archive for the National Archives, as part of the National Archives evaluation of digital preservation.

The websites will be collected using specially-designed crawler software, which will retrieve and store each page of the site. The harvesting of each site will be at varying intervals, with nine of the selected sites being harvested every week and the remaining 41 sites at six monthly intervals. All sites will be captured as originally appearing on the date they are archived, which can mean that as technology develops, some sites' features or functionality will be limited. All sites will be retrievable by the user entering the appropriate URL and then selecting the date of the archive they wish to view. To access the archives visit

### Data Protection

The British Institute of International and Comparative Law have just launched a group looking specifically at the issues of data protection. The Data Protection Research and Policy Group's main objective will be to enable the production of research on data protection law policy at all levels of governance and over a wide range of jurisdictions. ### Internet News and Web Developments

**Linex** is a newly evolved online service, based on the old Legalwebwatch service. It is a peer-to-peer information exchange, developed from a new concept for the exchange of information within the legal and corporate community. The Linex service aims to challenge the way lawyers and information officers have previously sourced information. It is a subscription based service, delivered weekly, monitoring Government organisations and UK and international law firms' websites, and information from legal news agencies. The main areas of coverage include developments from each legal practice area, deals which were advised on by leading UK and international law firms, and some legal opinions from leading practitioners. JustAsk is the **Legal Services Commission's** advice website aimed at those who find the traditional access methods to legal services difficult or complicated. The **Council for Licensed Conveyancers (CLC)** has relaunched its website. Under current legislation, it is now possible for people other than solicitors to become conveyancers, and to be known as licensed conveyancers. The site contains a fully searchable directory of licensed conveyancers, and will tell you whether the conveyancer is a full licence holder or employed licence holder. ## Legal Groups and Pilots

### e-conveyancing

The group behind PISCES – the Property Information Systems Common Exchange Standard – is stepping nearer

to its goal, with the publication of an extended working draft of its set of XML-based definitions for the automatic exchange of information between software applications used in a property lease transaction. The aim to reduce re-keying of text, thus minimising the room for error, should speed up all transactions, starting with property leases and investments, and planning to expand to residential transactions in the near future. ### On-line Interactive Auditing

The Legal Services Commission (LSC) has joined up with law firm Scott-Moncrieff Harbour and Sinclair to investigate the piloting of an on-line auditing system. Taking a firm's case management system as a basis, the project will allow auditors access to files under secure conditions. The interactive auditing means that questions are asked via email to the solicitors by the auditors during the audit and not all at the end, thus saving time and being less intrusive.

### Libra

Accenture have been awarded the contract to provide the delivery stage of the Libra project, which aims to standardise technology in all magistrates courts in England and Wales. The project is intended to speed up all case-related communication between courts and other criminal justice agencies, and to deal with all offenders much more quickly. Accenture are expected, over the next five years, to deliver a service which will manage and track all cases and the payment of fines, and manage court administration. This will involve training all court staff and the integration of all software. The software will be developed and maintained by STL Technologies. ### LITIG

In October, a sub-group of LITIG (Legal IT Innovators Group) started a seven month consultation period to agree an e-billing standard. They issued the paper to try and establish a standard to decrease some of the unnecessary inefficiencies, which occur between law firms and clients. Comments are required by 15 December.
