He is the author or co-author of more than 20 books on the problems of U.S. foreign and military policies and Soviet-American relations. His edited two-volume study on the "Contemporary Foreign Policy of the United States" (Moscow, 1984) is a comprehensive analysis of American foreign policy after World War II.

ARTHUR N. WALDRON is Research Associate of the East Asian Studies Department at Princeton University, where he has also been a Visiting Lecturer in History. He specializes in the history of East Asian foreign relations, and his forthcoming book deals with the political origins of the Great Wall of China.
