1. AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF PROCEDURE AND EVIDENCE

During the Twenty-second Plenary Session¹ the Judges of the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia (ICTY) decided to amend eight Rules of the Rules of Procedure and Evidence (Rules).²

Most of the amendments concern the qualifications and the disciplining of defence counsel before the ICTY, and allow sanctions for non-compliance with disciplinary measures.³ Rule 44 provides that counsel must speak one of the two official working languages of the Tribunal.⁴ However, the Registrar of the ICTY may admit exceptions in certain cases.⁵ Further, an Advisory Panel shall be established to assist the President and the Registrar in all matters relating to defence counsel.⁶ Rule 46(C) provides for the adoption and implementation of a Code of Professional Conduct in order to regulate the activities of counsel.⁷
