This is the Piedrafita cirque, culminated by the Punta Zarra peak (2944 m) to the left of the picture. Granite thresholds were polished by the ice, which retired from the valley bottom around 12 ka ago. Small glaciers developed afterwards, mainly during the Little Ice Age, located at the foot of the highest cliffs, with a rapid vanishing in the second half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.
